Prayer for the Holy Conclave in Rome. With the period of official mourning for the late Pope Francis concluded, the College of Cardinals of the Holy Roman Church have begun their prayer and deliberations to choose a successor to Pope Francis. Although often described by modern day journalists as a secret process (which it is) as if it's something sinister. This process has evolved over nearly 2000 years of Universal Christianity. In the earliest days of the church every Christian in Rome could vote for their new Bishop (when they weren't fending off wild animals in the various persecutions!). Once Christianity was legalised under the Roman Emperor Constantine, and the church gained lands prestige and power, various emerging nations and tribes tried to influence the election of the Bishop of Rome (The Pope) to access this land and power. Later, to prevent this intrusion into church life, the election of the Pope was limited to the parish priests of Rome (this is why still today each Cardinal is given a titular church within Rome...Rome has many many churches!). Then even more recently, as the rank of clergy now known as Cardinals grew up, the election of the Bishop of Rome and the successor of St Peter was limited to the Cardinals, and once the Sistine chapel was completed in 1481, the procedure of locking the Cardinals in the chapel was begun until they elected a successor (Conclave is latin for "Locked in with a key") was established. More recently in the pontificate of St John Paul II the age of voting at a Conclave for a Cardinal was limited to those under 80 years.

So there is nothing sinister in this secrecy. Silence, prayer, and listening focuses a human being on the matter before him, especially if the issue is as important as the election of a Pope. Our prayer will, I'm sure assist the conclave and the new Pope (especially if we have one when you read these words!!)
